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Notes From The CEO

Just because something is legal – doesn't mean it is the right thing to do.

We had an incident recently reported where someone was flying legally, but given the circumstances and their experience, would have been better to have asked an instructor to do a few circuits with them.

I am sure you can think of other instances where something might be technically legal but is probably not a great idea. To avoid new rules being put in place that might put additional restrictions on us, take a step back in a new situation, and apply the judgement that as a pilot, you will have, and assess your skill level.

While on the topic of skill levels, there was a saying I heard during my training many years ago. Are you a pilot with 500 hours experience, or a pilot with 1 hour of experience, 500 times. There is nothing wrong with heading out on a Saturday and doing some circuits, or visiting the same 1 or 2 airstrips, but occasionally it is good to broaden that experience a little. Fly with another pilot to a new field, or in a group the RAANZ Fly-in.Get rated in a new type of aircraft – a low wing (or high wing), a tail wheel, or one of the club aircraft you haven't flown – or if it's been a while, grab an instructor and head into a controlled airfield. Learning new things is what keeps us sharp (and young ③)

I hope the New Year is treating you all well and planning is underway for the National Fly-in, Matamata March 3-5. I'm certainly looking forward to clear skies and a tailwind both ways.

Thanks to all those who have submitted Accident / Incident Reports as required and there have been quite a few of late.

I know these events can be quite unsettling butwe can all learn from what has occurred and possibly stop the next similar event from happening.

Some common themes are becoming evident and most relate to how we gather, process and use the information (or not) that is available. Some blockers to the processing of information have been identified in recent occurrences.

Task Fixation or Entrapment / Continuation Bias

This is where we have a particular task in progress and are determined to continue, not picking up or ignoring information that is trying to tell us that things are not working. The closer we get to home base and the longer we have been working on the task the more likely we are to continue. It is essential we take the blinkers off and continue to gather all information about our progress. If you find yourself rushing or when things start not adding up, chances are it is about to turn to custard. Slow Down and rethink the plan.

We are Recreational Aviators. We are not on a war footing.

Confirmation Bias.

Whenever we make a decision there is a strong tendency to look for information to confirm our decision was right. That is good. What is bad is continuing to look for that good information while ignoring information that is telling us that our decision was not right.

Having made your mind up that the other traffic would be in your 4 o'clock and would tuck in behind and continuing to look only in that direction is not good when the aircraft is fact converging in your 2 o'clock.



ADMINISTRATION

If it isn't working change the plan, move the head and the eyes. Getting on the radio can also assist.

If there are any concerns about another aircraft, a pilot is encouraged to challenge or question the pilot of that aircraft. For example, by asking them to repeat their position report or confirming they have them in sight.

Currency V Current

Part of our Exposition talks about being current i.e., 3 take off and landings in the previous 90 days to carry a passenger. This is a legal minimum.


Real currency depends on a myriad of factors and may require more attention than the legal minimum.

Some of the factors that determine Real Currency are:

- Total aviation experience
- Recent aviation experience
- Recent experience on type
- How much consolidation have you done on type
- How much recent experience have you had on a similar type

Be brutally honest about your Real Currency and if you have any doubts at all grab an Instructor.

Keep safe out there, we are always learning.



Database issues

There have been a number of changes on our website and there may be the occasional bit that isn't working properly. If you notice anything, please let admin@raanz.org.nz know and we will sort asap.

Switching to Xero

We have switched our accounting system to Xero, with its associated advantages and disadvantages. But overall, it gives us more automation and flexibility in managing, analysing and controlling our finances and membership.

Some changes you will see at your next renewal time:

- We will issue membership invoices around the 15th of the month before your membership falls due.
- The invoice will be for a 1 year term only- it is difficult to provide a 1 or 2 year option via invoicing.
- You may pay either by direct credit via your bank, with your credit card via Paypal, or credit card over the phone.
- Payment via PayMate will no longer be supported.
- The invoice will not list your actual membership expiry date- Xero doesn't support custom fields to allow this.
- But your payment will extend your membership from the current expiry date forwards- you won't be short changed.
- We will issue a membership payment confirmation with your new expiry date.
- The system will automatically issue a payment reminder at 14 and 28 days if not already paidthis will help ensure you have uninterrupted membership and flight privileges.
- You will still see your all your expiry dates on your RecPilot notice and medical and BFR expiry reminders.
